Meaning of Periplus



The word “periplus” stems from Greek, meaning “journey” and also means a circumnavigation or sea voyage around a coastline.

The use of a periplus, or journal, dates back to the second century and was a document listing, in order, the ports and coastal landmarks, with approximate intervening distances, that the captain of a vessel could expect to find along a shore. In that sense, the periplus was a type of log, similar to the modern day ship’s log.

We use the term for our newsletter since it is the documentation of our travels at the Club and offshore and provides a historical record for us to reminisce and share with others. It is our shared and unique history as Club members.

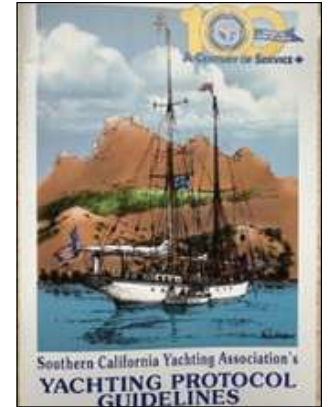

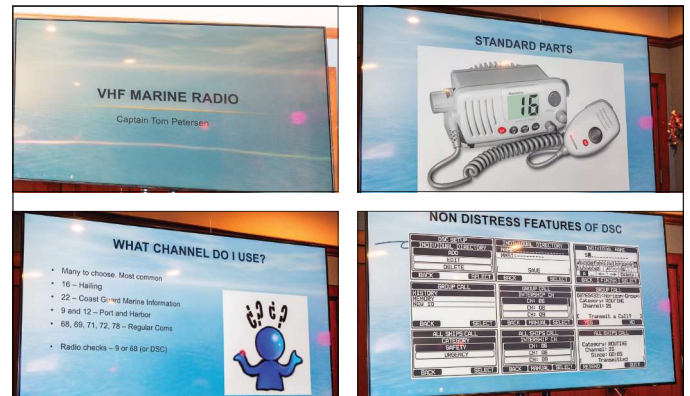

Race Committee Chair

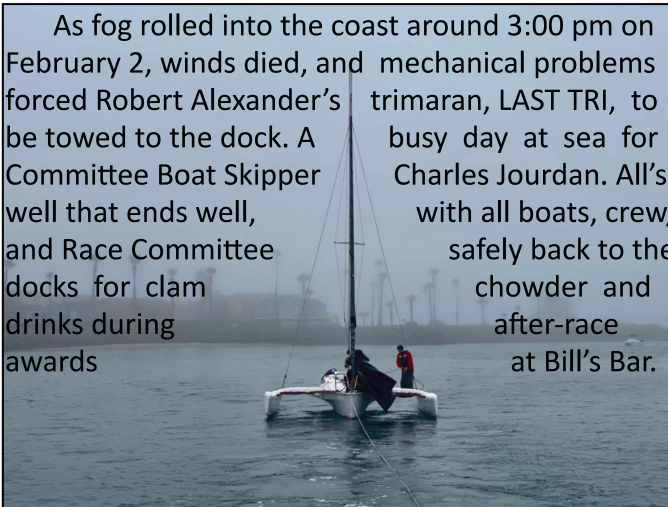

Rescue at Sea!

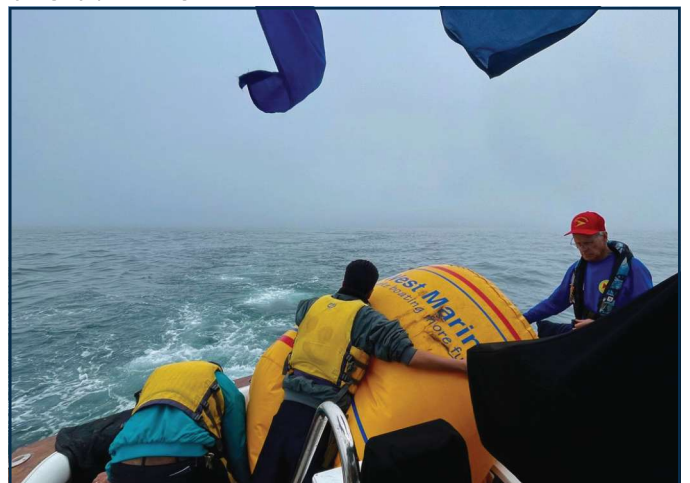

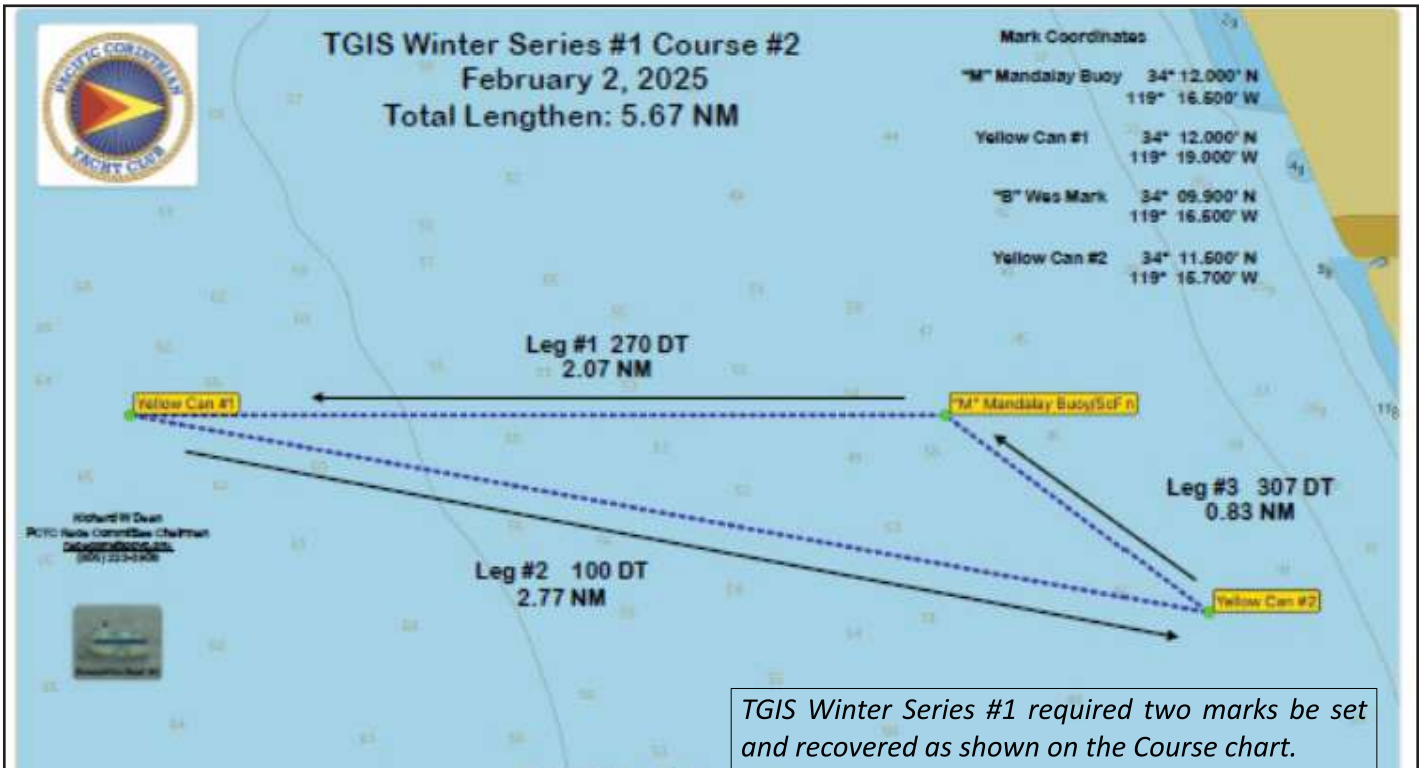
(Above) Mark Slothower and Stew Lyons, PCYC Race Rescue Committee, discuss towing operations following PCYC's race on Sunday.

Winter Safety Boat Checks

With the winter season here, many PCYC boaters may find ourselves with less underway time due to seasonal weather. It's a very good time to review the safety equipment on our boats. I like to take the time to make sure it is all up to date and ready when needed.

First and foremost, fire extinguishers. Check the portable fire extinguishers and make sure they are ready and in good working order. Check the pressure gauge and make sure it reads (green) charged.

Next check the automatic fire suppression system for the engine compartment. This should be done by a professional who will go into the engine compartment and inspect the system. The cost is minimal, and you will know that the system will work if needed. Your insurance carrier may require it too.

Review the boat's life jackets. There are different types of life jackets, classified by type. BoatUS is a good resource for understanding the best use for each life jacket type I-V. I wear the inflatable life jacket while underway. They are activated and inflated both manually and automatically. Check the charging mechanism to make sure the life jacket will in fact inflate. I also like to have a Personal Locator Beacon attached to my life jacket. If you don't have a throw line with a flotation device, get one, in the event of someone going overboard.

Check your first aid kits and make sure they are in good working order. Does anything in the kit need replacement?

Check the Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon (EPIRB). Make sure it is in good working order and that it is properly registered. EPIRBs are registered with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The registration provides the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG)

with information to assist in the search and rescue: who you are, your boat type and size, your GPS position and other important data, including emergency contact information.

Life rafts have a defined service life. Check your life rafts recommended service interval to make sure that it will inflate if deployed. Avalon Life rafts in Long Beach can do this. A ditch bag may be part of your life raft. If not get a ditch bag. It should have flares, a strobe light, a handheld VHF, a whistle, handheld foghorn, etc.

Check the smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and replace the batteries.

If you don't already have one, prepare a safety check list. I use this to review safety equipment with my crew and guests before departure. Include instructions on how to operate the VHF-DSC radio and especially the Digital Select Calling (DSC red) button. The DSC is yet another way to get help by quickly providing USCG with your location. Your VHF-DSC radio needs to have the Maritime Mobile Service Identity (MMSI) number programmed in for it to be effective. This should be done at initial install and setup of the radio.

The Burgee, a small triangular flag adorned with a club's insignia, began as a communication tool between ships at sea. Today, the Burgee symbolizes connection and friendship among sea faring communities. It is customary for a visiting club to present its Burgee to the host club as a gesture of goodwill and respect. The host reciprocates, sealing the connection between the two clubs.

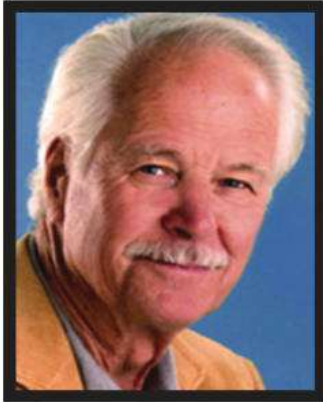
